The Rwandan-Canadian Healing Centre (RCHC), founded in 2018 by Kizito Musabimana, is a federally registered not-for-profit organization based in Toronto, Canada. RCHC strives to provide an environment for Rwandan Canadians and other members of the Black Canadian society working to overcome traumatic experiences from genocides, wars and legacies of slavery and oppression.

RCHC is governed by a national 7-member Board of Directors and Advisors. Members are drawn from across Canada's Rwandan and African-Canadian Black community leaders.

Message from the Chair

This past year marks two short years since the Rwandan Canadian Healing Centre (RCHC or the "Centre") opened its doors in Toronto. The formal creation of the Centre came after its Founder Mr. Kizito Musabinama, an inspiring Rwandan-Canadian, walked from Toronto to Montreal during 17 cold winter days to raise awareness about Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder related to past wars, genocides and the colonial legacy of oppression. His inspiring journey motivated me and other community members to step-up as the inaugural board of directors, advisors and management at RCHC. I am proud of the work fellow board members, advisors as well as management have done and continue to do. Their invaluable work moves the Centre a step closer to providing an environment for Rwandan Canadians and other members of the Black and African-Canadian society working to overcome mental health challenges, to move toward healing and integrate fully in Canadian society.

Over 2019-20, we achieved a lot toward our healing, rebuilding and learning strategy. Despite the COVID-19 global pandemic, we continued to grow in our strategic and operational initiatives. In July 2019, RCHC received its first major public grant for its inaugural project and completed the phase one of the African Canadian Leadership Training and e-Capacity Support Project funded by the Government of Canada's Community Support, Multiculturalism, and Anti-Racism Initiatives (CSMARI) led by the Department of Canada's Emergency Community Support Fund led by Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) administered by the Canadian Red Cross Society (CRCS). The CRCS Emergency Community Support Fund was dedicated to developing a digital resource platform, the Afri-Canadian Resource Centre, which facilitates easy access to COVID-19 resources for continental African Canadian communities; beginning with the most affected, left without support during the novel Coronavirus pandemic.

These financial resources secured in 2019-20 allowed the Centre to enhance capacity for our e-tools, hire more personnel and consultants to run our programs. The Centre also created very successful and innovative online training programs in Good Governance, Leadership and Diversity and Inclusion delivered by Hon. Olivia Chow, Dr. Olu Oyelade, Prof. Amanuel Melles and myself.

The Centre has also been an active participant in helping develop leadership and rebuild financial capacity for Toronto-based Rwandan/African community organizations. Through the Toronto Rwandan/African Community Cluster, RCHC secured funding for a dozen community organizations in partnership with The Network of Advancement for Black Communities (NABC) and CARY Toronto.

The Centre's achievements in 2019-20, which you will discover in these pages, are even much more encouraging given with the world facing uncertain times during this global pandemic. I am confident that RCHC will continue to implement its strategies and responsibilities toward healing, rebuilding and learning.

Message from the Executive Director

I'm often asked: "Why a Centre for Healing?

"Going back about 10 years go, in 2012, had you met the 30-year-old me, you would've encountered someone on the brink of death; someone filled with terror, afraid to face inner "demons", and perhaps even more terrifying; someone lost and buried behind alcoholism, daily doses of cigarettes and other drugs - a version of me that merely survived. Consumed by fearful and suicidal thoughts and drained of energy I could barely face the world.

So, before you ask, **"Why the Healing Centre?"** Allow me to share a brief journey down memory lane with you.

By 2013, after a thorough research on my identity both as a Rwandan, an African, and as a Black man living in Canada, I had developed the courage to finally face myself, which led to recognition that I was like many in my Rwandan and African Canadian community members who are suffering from PTSD and trauma, mostly caused by the challenging lives we've journeyed to get here, not to mention remanence of ancestral, colonial and slavery trauma memories. My awakening in 2013 led to a phase of vision crafting, where I now understood that the trauma transcended one's lifetime, hence why the Centre for Healing.

Using a holistic approach, I was able to overcome PTSD, and in 2016 I decided to raise awareness and advocate for my Rwandan-Canadian community and others who struggle with war-related trauma like I did.

I was fortunate to find leaders with similar interest in the Rwandan-Canadian community, and in 2018 we founded the Rwandan Canadian Healing Centre (RCHC), with a mission to establish an organization that not only understood and treated trauma & PTSD, but one which also takes part in the rebuilding effort necessary in order for those with trauma and PTSD in disfranchised and underdeveloped communities can have a similar opportunity as I did to face their "demons" through holistic approaches.

From day one, when we imaged the RCHC, we wanted to create an organization that took time to learn the causes of existing issues, so to best understand the cause of suffering and to create lasting solutions to issues like poverty, the never-ending wars, or fears of wars and other socio-economic challenges in our communities. It is only then that dealing with a complex issue of understanding and healing Trauma and PTSD would be made possible.

RCHC's Theory of Change

Since taking on the role as the Executive Director of the RCHC, we made it our focus to bridge our work with surrounding community members, especially those with similar experiences, like those in the African Canadian community, and communities that recently faced genocides and holocaust, such as the Jewish, Indigenous, Armenian, Cambordian and other communities. As the Executive Director of the RCHC, one questions I ask myself and work to answer each day, is;

"What is the nature of the challenge I'm facing now?"

Whether it's mental health, PTSD, poverty, or other socio-economic challenges our communities face daily, my duty and our work as team at the RCHC is to first and foremost; understand the cause factors, then through cross-sector collaboration or partnership, work with organizations and community leaders to best create a suitable environment, the capacity, as well as good leadership that allows for the healing, growth and development of individuals, organizations, and communities alike.

This year, RCHC is focusing on the growth and development of our team of volunteers, staff, and board members; while extending cross-sector collaborative efforts with surrounding communities who share similar challenges, understanding, as well as values; all while maintaining current and previously-run projects.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION

A snapshot of RCHC's accomplishments in 2019-20 are as follows:

• July 2019

The African Canadian Leadership Training and e-Capacity Support **Project** was funded by the Government of Canada's Community Support, Multiculturalism, and Anti-Racism Initiatives (CSMARI) led by the Department of Canadian Heritage.

• August 2020

In August 2020, the Centre was again awarded funding through the Government of Canada's Emergency Community Support Fund led by Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) administered by the Canadian Red Cross Society (CRCS) for the **AfriCanadian Resource Centre Project**.

• September 2020

RCHC Collaborated with the Network for the Advancement for Black Communities (NABC) to help raise funds through the United Way & the Red-Cross Society - part of the Government of Canada's Emergency Community Support Fund. These funds went towards ongoing COVID Response activities of 10 organizations - forming the **Rwandan Ontarian Collaborative**.

Notes to the financial statements March 31, 2020

1. Purpose of organization

The Rwandan Canadian Healing Centre ("the Centre") was incorporated under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act (NFP Act) under the number 1073436-5.

The purpose of the Centre is to build a Healing Centre for all those who struggle with Post-Traumatic Syndrome Disorder (PTSD) and other trauma-related effects.

To that affect the Centre launched a project called "African Canadian Leadership Training and e-capacity Support Project" which will increase the capacity of the Centre to deliver the mandate as well as enhance the media platform to reach and serve a broader community to address and promote diversity an inclusion in Canada

The Centre is exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1)(I) of the Income Tax Act.

2. Significant accounting policies

The Centre's financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations ("ASNPO").

The Centre's accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and reflect the following policies:

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in a bank account.

Revenue recognition

The Centre receives contributions from the Government of Canada to fund operations. The Centre follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Contribution revenue from the Government of Canada are recognized in the period in which the related expenditures are incurred.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized at fair value. Financial assets include cash and amount receivables. Cash and accounts receivables are measured at cost. The Centre currently does not hold any equity instrument.

Donated services

Many people and organizations contribute their time and effort to the success of the Centre. The benefit and the cost of donated services are recognized in these financial statements at fair value.

3. Contributions from Government of Canada

Funding received for the 2019-2020 fiscal year was in accordance with an agreement with the Government of Canada that provides for total contributions of up to \$69,499.00 During the year, the Centre received payments of \$62,550.00 from the Government of Canada.

The contribution agreement specifies that the funding must be used for the eligible expenditures under the contribution agreement, or returned to the Government of Canada. Eligible expenditures are determined as Travel and Administration. The Centre recognized \$69,499.00 as revenue, and is holding \$6,949.00 as deferred revenue to be applied in the next fiscal year. The Centre does not have an excess of revenue over expenses.

4. Commitments The Centre has entered into a one year lease agreement on November 15th, 2019. The payments due under these contract is \$5,250
